## Bus stop

Aim: For children to explore how choices are made and decision-making.

Skills: Cooperating, participating, listening, decision-making, thinking, concentrating

Age: 5-11

Two lengths of rope are placed across the circle to represent the bus. The teacher is the bus driver and the class are the passengers.

They all get on the bus by standing between the two lengths of rope. The bus driver reads a pair

of choices and the children have to get off the bus on the indicated side, depending on their choice. The children get back on the bus and the activity is repeated.

## Discussion:

This can open up a discussion on differences and similarities. It can also lead to thoughts about decision-making. When do people make up their own mind and when do they go with the crowd? Was it easy to keep to your choice if you were the only one making it?

You could then make a list of more difficult choices:

Spend Money
Do as your friends do
Do homework now
Play with friends
Find out for yourself
Save Money
Think for yourself
Do homework later
Play with new people
Ask for help

This can lead into a discussion about the power of making a real choice. They are not necessarily right or wrong answers but will shape their experience, e.g. being rushed if they do their homework at the last minute.
